FAMILY TRADITIONS



After Hurricane Irene came to town in 2011, Trinity hosted a spaghetti supper for people without power and no hot meals. Then Hurricane Sandy blew in the next year, and we did the same thing. One family showed up that evening and said, "We're back; it's a

tradition now! If there's a hurricane, we come to Trinity!" There are other families whose traditions have been supported by Trinity. Children have had presents to open on Christmas morning because their families were recommended to us by Angel Tree and the Branford Counseling Center.

One of the things that I loved learning about when I first came to Trinity was how many families had been here for generations. Not only was the church an historic place, but it had special family histories as well. This is a place of special celebrations, baptisms, marriages, and final goodbyes. As such, we have touched families from all over. We live in family memories and lore.

For more than 100 years the Trinity Fair has been a tradition on the Branford Green. There are all kinds of stories about pony rides and dinner dances at the country club: the Fair has been many things. It is a fund raiser; it is a fun raiser; it is gentle evangelism and hospitality. Every year I see young families coming for pancakes, face painting, peach shortcake, and stuffed animals in the tag sale; and I realize that a family tradition can be started at any moment. Last year, kids learned about a labyrinth, and saw generosity laid out on the lawn. Perhaps a seed was planted for a tradition of compassion and giving.

Traditions connect us to our past and weave us together for the future.

It's months in the making, but well worth it. Thanks SA team!





