About Epiphany

January 6th is the Feast of the Epiphany. The word comes from the Greek *epiphaneia* which means appearance or manifestation. It is the twelfth day after Christmas and the traditional arrival of the visitors from the east – the Magi. They brought him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to this Son of David. They represent the gentile world for whom Christ is also born.

The feast is characterized by light – the light of a star observed by the astronomer Magi which they followed to Israel so that they might see and worship the child who must indeed be important to warrant such a celestial sign.

Twelfth Night is the night to create a bonfire out of the Christmas trees and follow it with a feast. In Tudor England, the Twelfth Night marked the end of a winter festival that started on All Hallows Eve--which we now celebrate as Halloween. On this day the King and all those who were high would become the peasants and vice versa. At the beginning of the Twelfth Night festival, a cake that contained a bean was eaten. The person who found the bean would rule the feast. Midnight signaled the end of his rule and the world would return to normal. King cakes are popular today in France and also in New Orleans although the bean or *fève* has been replaced by a small ceramic figurine.

At Trinity this year, we will celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany on Sunday, Jan. 2 and then on the 6th, you are all encouraged to light a candle, enjoy a piece of cake and be King or Queen for the day!

Worship Ministry

After all of our *extraordinary time* – Advent, Christmas, Epiphany and The Baptism of our Lord, we will return to *ordinary time* – on January 16th. The color will be green once again and will remain so for eight weeks until Ash Wednesday on March 9th. During this time we will return to singing the Lord's Prayer at the 10:00 service and other familiar settings of the service music.

At a special worship service on December 8th, members of the Worship Ministry experienced a different kind of Prayers of the People – a meditation set to music. Many of those present expressed their interest in more of this very peaceful, centering kind of prayer.

"I found myself deep in prayer. It was very moving. It is also a wonderful way to include some music in the 8:00 service." – Blake Lehr

"The Prayer Meditation was moving and beautiful. It gave me the opportunity to speak with my Dad (who passed away 7 years ago) and pray for friends and family members in a quiet and reflective (undisturbed) setting. I let the music wash over and around me in a flowing manner and with a calming influence... as did Sharon's prayers. That evening I had the best night's sleep that I have had in weeks!" - Cheryl Hyder

It is our plan to use this prayer meditation for the eight week green season between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday. Then during Lent, we will return to one of the familiar forms for the Prayers of the People in the Book of Common Prayer.

Spiritual Disciplines or Practices: seeking a deeper knowledge of God

During this season of Advent, Sharon helped us to look at a series of disciplines as tools for our spiritual growth and freedom. Their purpose is the replacement of old destructive habits with new life-giving ones. Quoting Richard Foster, author of *Celebration of Discipline: The Path to Spiri*- *tual Growth,* Foster says, "...they are God's way of getting us into the ground (like seeds); they put us where (God) can work with us and transform us. By themselves the Spiritual Disciplines can do nothing; they can only get us to the place where something can be done. They are God's means of grace."

The discipline of Prayer. This is the primary means by which we open ourselves to God. Foster says that prayer "ushers us into perpetual communion with God." The more we commit ourselves to this communion, the more we experience God's power in our lives to heal and transform and guide us to new discoveries. With practice, we get better at it.

The discipline of Study. We are transformed through the renewal of the mind. We can study scripture, nature, people and we can study ourselves all in our quest to know God better. It is important for us to be informed about our faith and to ask the big questions:

Who is God? Who are we? What do we do now?

The discipline of Simplicity. This discipline helps us live in integrity with others and the planet. We were reminded of the familiar Appalachian melody *'Tis a gift to be simple; 'tis a gift to be free..."*, that teaches us to appreciate the "little things" and be true to one another. The questions we can ask ourselves are:

Do I need it? Can I live without it? Why do I want it?

The discipline of Submission. This is really the crux of Christianity. Submission requires a change of focus from self orientation to one of mutual subordination, a spirit of consideration and deference. Submission and the freedom that it brings has the power to change the world and make us truly ready for Christ to be born in us. The questions we can ask ourselves are:

Worship Ministry

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Do I need to win here? Can I put what I want aside and let go of it? Can I be a servant leader and find satisfaction or even joy that someone else's needs are met?

The discipline of Celebration. This is the expression of joy about being alive and knowing that we are a cherished part of God's wondrous creation. It is also a way to acknowledge the freedom that we seek in the practice of our other disciplines. It is the joyous culmination of all of the other work. Because celebration is all about joy, it can manifest in many wonderful ways.

It might be helpful to try this spiritual discipline thing backwards, start with celebration.

Let your prayer be a celebration of relationships, with God, with those for whom you pray, and with the whole world.


Let your study be joyous curiosity, galloping toward new ideas and fresh insight on traditions.

Let the discipline of submission be a means of celebrating other's joy and triumphs.

And then when you celebrate, don't hold back, let your joy be infectious, share it with others.
