Hope, Peace, Joy and Love

Published by Trinity Episcopal Church - on the Green in Branford, Connecticut

The Church Year begins with the Season of Advent in November/December, on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, the Sunday closest to November 30. The word Advent means "coming" or "arrival." It is the time of waiting for the coming of the Messiah that is celebrated at Christmas; thus it is known as the season of anticipation and hope. Advent symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and congregations, as they affirm that Christ has come, that He is present in the world today, and that He will come again in power.

The primary color of advent is blue, which means hope and waiting, and aligns with the seasonal meaning of Advent. Advent used to have more emphasis on penitence and fasting; and at the third week rejoicing began that the fasting was almost over; and so the rose colored Sunday Advent candle turns attention to the rejoicing.

The Advent wreath came to America from

Protestant Germany in the 1930s; but there are differing opinions about the origination. Some say it was a symbol in Europe long before the arrival of Chris-



tianity, others that it was in common use in the Middle Ages, still others that it was not invented until the 19th century in Germany. We know it as a Christian tradition that marks the journey of the four weeks of Advent.

The wreath is made of evergreens with four candles in the circle, symbolizing the eternal cycle of the seasons, and a fifth, white candle in the center, known as the Christ candle.

Hope, Peace, Joy and Love

The light of the candle reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world, dispelling the darkness. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, one candle is lit each week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit, and the Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve. The first candle is hope, the second is peace, the third is joy, and the fourth is love.*

The emphasis for this season is contrary to the media message. It is for slowing down, simplifying, creating quiet for reflection, and allowing the hope, peace, love and joy to be born in us.

Poinsettias on the Altar for Christmas

Last spring, we introduced a new process to keep track of the annual Easter lily and Christmas poinsettia memorials. All of the memorials were recorded in a database, noting whether or not the donor participates at both Easter and Christmas, and whether the memorial names were the same or different for each memorial.

Everyone who donated lilies at Easter (and submitted a list of memorials), will receive a letter with instructions on how to continue their memorial(s) for Christmas. Simply return the letter to



Trinity Church, along with your donation for the poinsettias. You can, of course, add or delete names. Donors who specified different names for Easter and Christmas will receive a letter listing the Christmas names.

For parishioners who have not had plant memorials before, there will be a form to complete. Beginning Sunday, December 1, forms will be at the back of the church, and on the table in the Parish Hall lobby. To ensure inclusion in the Christmas list, please note the submission deadline is no later than **Wednesday**, **December 18, 2013.**

December 22, The Christmas Pageant

At your Christmas meal, the eldest person present wishes all "Happy Christmas, may God grant us all blessings and peace in the year ahead." The wafer is broken and shared around the table, with each person offering a Christmas wish. Wafers will be distributed at worship on Christmas Eve. Merry Christmas!

At **5:00** PM, a special service designed with excited children in mind will set the right tone for Christmas. Music, a reading from *The Velveteen Rabbit*—the telling of Jesus' birth—and the holy meal at the Lord's Table, all make for a very Holy Night.

December 1, Advent Begins

The silent procession to the slow steady beat of chimes sets the stage for our Advent worship. The parts of the service that we always sing-known as "service music"—change: instead of the celebratory Gloria, the choir will alternate two different settings of the Kyrie, both rich with harmony and mystery. The Sanctus (Holy, holy, holy) will change to the familiar setting by Franz Schubert.



The Fraction Anthem at the Breaking of the Bread will also be different, but follow the same pattern, with parts for you to sing. The tune for our Lord's Prayer will be a traditional plainsong chant. But the true star of Advent worship is the hymnody. Advent hymns are the most beautiful, haunting, and evocative of the whole year.

The Right Reverend Ian T. Douglas is the 15th Bishop of the Diocese of Connecticut. He is the first to have been elected from outside of Connecticut. We went all the way to Massachusetts to find him. Bishop Douglas will be visiting us on January 19, to preach and celebrate. He will also confirm those who wish to be confirmed in the Episcopal Church, or receive those who have been confirmed elsewhere and wish
