Remembrances of Archie

Thank you to Winnifred Judge, Archivist, and parishioners who shared their memories.

April 14, 2002, was proclaimed to be Archie Day by the First Selectman of the Town of Branford. Parishioners remember the special service, the celebration, and the worthiness of The Rev. Archibald Hanna, Jr., who served Trinity as Assistant Rector for 21 years, 1961-1982. Then Rector Hank Burdick spoke of Archie as "...gifted, gracious, with a holiness and gentle presence." Archie's gift from Trinity was a new stained glass window in the tower of the church, to be known as The Hanna Window. Archie died in 2010 at the age of 93, before the window could be realized. But he would undoubtedly agree, that the breathtaking beauty of the window compensates for the wait.

The Preacher

Archie and his wife Sue (officially Edith Sue Mensch Hanna) fell in love with Branford and

Trinity Church when they arrived in 1941. Combining his natural story-teller skills with his education and life experiences made his sermons interesting; he wove many threads together,

which, amazingly, were all in his memory. He was a father of three children, historian (Yale History Department, Research Associate), scholar (educated to PhD), WW II Marine Corps Intelligence Lieutenant Colonel, editor, teacher, author, traveler, carpenter, gardener, and avid book reader. In 1961, Bishop Gray ordained Archie as a Perpetual Deacon - a rare position.

The Teacher

Some of the best Sundays were when Archie

feel blessed to be in this holy place. Attendees at his Bible classes remember fascinating discussions. Archie said, "The great book you can never get through reading is the Bible. It will say something different to you at every stage of your life."

The Librarian

Archie's great love of books earned him a thirty-year career at Yale University as Curator of the Western Americana Collection in the Beinecke Rare Book and Manuscript Library. The Hannas spent many summers traveling throughout the country, looking for books to add to Yale's collections. He would have the interests of certain people in mind too; and he would find perfect books for them. His wife's Charity Cook Book collection was legendary. The Hannas were regular attendees at church potluck suppers; and decades later, Sue's colorful, multi-layered, jelly molds are well-remembered! Trinity's library in the Guild Room was started by Archie; and he donated the book cart that is in the Narthex (entry to the church). He authored two books: *The Thimble Islands of Branford, which* may be purchased through the Branford Historical Society, and a bibliography of John Buchan.

Realizing the Gift

Progress on funding The Hanna Window began in earnest in early 2012. Determined that the gift would be realized, Vestry member Carol Schaller successfully approached The Foote Foundation for donations, which invigorated a fresh campaign. Supported by Rev. Sharon's can-do outlook, Carol served as the Chair of the Committee that has worked tirelessly for the past two years. Membership includes: Carol and Barry Schaller, Rev. Sharon, Peter Schuller, Perdita and Otty Norwood, Mark McElrath and Sandy Baldwin. Their outstanding stewardship pays tribute to an outstanding man, and adds another jewel to enhance the beauty of Trinity Church for future generations to enjoy.

A Visit From Peggy White Wellknown Buffalo

On Sunday, November 24, Trinity Church will have an important visitor, Peggy White Wellknown Buffalo, a member of the Crow Nation, Montana. Peggy is the founder of The Center Pole (with whom Trinity's Native American Outreach team has partnered), which works to help Crow children prepare for higher education, as well as run programs to

meet basic needs. The Center sits on the land that has been in Peggy's family for generations. It is the land on which women and children of several tribes took refuge as a battle raged nearby at the Little Big Horn. She has committed herself to the welfare of her people, striving to improve



their lives through health care and education. She is a creative problem solver.

Peggy Wellknown Buffalo has been recognized by many as a light to her people. This coming February, she will be honored by the Dalai Lama. We welcome Peggy and the co-leader of The Center Pole, Susan Kelly, so that they may share the story of the Crow people and the work that we have begun with them. Peggy and Susan will be present during November's adult forum time at 9:00 AM, and will also share the sermon time with Rev. Sharon. It will be an honor to have them with us.

Return to Haiti

Janet Constantino and Rev. Sharon will journey southward again, with Global Health Ministry, to set up clinics in the villages surrounding Gros



Morne, in the northern mountains of Haiti. For the people who come to the clinics, it is often their only opportunity all year to access health care. The goal of Global Health Ministry is to create a network of local health care, with people trained in each village to monitor symptoms and keep people supplied with their prescriptions and a connection to



Stewardship is simply a way of being in the world. It's how you live your life every day. It's a way of embracing one's spiritual life, a way of being drawn into a deeper relationship with God. Fall is my favorite season. For me, it represents change, which is a necessary ingredient for new growth. Right before the start of our current Sunday school year, Cathy Seibyl and

I rearranged the Godly Play classrooms to give new spiritual growth to both the children and the teachers. Once more we are grateful to Mike McGuinness for fine handmade furniture—we love the stools!

Our budget supports adding more *Godly Play* stories for the youngest and the older children; two stories are from the newly published Volume Eight-the capstone volume, *The Greatest Parable and Mary, the Mother of Jesus;* another is a much-needed core story entitled *The Synagogue and the Upper Room.* The first part evokes the Liturgy of the Word; and the second part evokes The Liturgy of the Table. Together they form a model of Christian worship, joining The Old and New Testaments. For the older children, we added *Expansion of Saints.* There are twelve saints (one for each month of the year) and the flags from the countries they represent. All Saints Day is November 1; so the children will experience this story the following Sunday. Lastly, both classrooms will hear the story of the *Feast of Epiphany* on January 5.



The teachers and I are very excited to share the new stories with the children, and to witness the ways in which the children will grow this year. Please feel free to ask for a tour of our classrooms when class is not in session.

Vestry Nominations


