COUNCIL OF MINISTRIES RESTRUCTURING



The framed picture on the Narthex wall was a gift from Rev. Sharon at the time of her installation as Rector.

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Three years ago, Trinity created the Council of Ministries (CoM) to organize the work of this parish. Ten ministries were identified, each with a chairperson, composite programs, a mandate, and a budget. We have lived into this structure well, but along the way we identified several programs and ministries that didn't quite fit. There were always questions about Spirituality and Education - how are they different or similar - would they be better combined? Pastoral Care had been a part of Parish Life, then changed to Spirituality. Where does it best belong?

At the spring Vestry/CoM retreat, a group was given the task of re-organizing the Council structure. Rev. Sharon, Wardens Mark McElrath and Rodney Hayes, Sandy Baldwin, Ann Freeman, Martha Monico, and Cathy Seibyl met, and suggested the following changes;

- There is now a Spiritual Education Ministry; including Godly Play, Middle School Sunday School, Youth Group, Adult Forums, Newcomer classes/ Episcopalian 101, Bible Study, and other classes.
- Pastoral Care is a ministry on its own, encompassing the Lay Eucharistic Visitors, the Prayer Chain, meals and transportation for those in need, and healing prayers by the baptismal font during communion.
- Stewardship has been expanded to include the Health Ministry, Newcomer Ministry, use of our buildings, environmental concerns, as well as our work as financial stewards, which includes the fall pledge campaign.

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FROM THE RECTOR



We have talked quite a bit around Trinity about some of the changes emerging within western Christianity. One of them turns the old formula "*Believe...behave...belong*" on its head. Traditionally, people were told what beliefs were expected in order to be a part of a Christian congregation or denomination. Next, the attending behaviors were explained, and finally one would be able to belong. Well, no more. "*Belong...behave...believe*" is the emerging model. A desire and sense of belonging is where everything begins. It may come from an appreciation for the style of worship, the friendliness of the congregation, or priorities and opportuni-

ties for engagement. Joining in worship and programs engage us in the behaviors of prayer, love of neighbor, and fellowship. What someone believes will flow from these first two *B*s. It is possible for someone to desire to belong while being quite unsure of what they believe.

The *Behave* component of this formula is playing out with great gusto here at Trinity. In 2014 we have seen a surge in people volunteering, accepting a call to a particular ministry, and a willingness to try something new. The level of participation in what we do is on the rise. Participation increases a sense of belonging, and it feeds the soul. Our choir has grown; the Out-

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STEWARDSHIP OF OUR TIFFANY WINDOWS

The windows are over 100 years old, and have been a source of delight for this congregation and visitors. They are treasures that need care and attention. During the installation of our new Debra Coombs/Archie Hanna window, we had several experts examine the Tiffanys. They all show signs of deterioration. In the case of the pair of Parker windows on the lectern side of the church, there is some alarming damage due to heat buildup. The bowing has stressed and is beginning to crack the glass. Needless to say, this must be addressed posthaste. The Young window (Standing Angel) at the front on the pulpit side is not as critical, and is therefore scheduled for restoration at a later date.

The Stained Glass Window Committee has researched and selected two firms to do the work. Your Vestry is formulating a plan to finance the work using some funds from the Trinity Endowment, some by capital campaign, and the balance through a loan from the

Diocese of Connecticut. You will hear more about this very soon.

Branford Festival and Trinity Sunday

We sit at the epicenter of Branford's biggest event. The Festival happens on the Green, all around us, which gives us opportunities and an occasional bit of stress. We strive to be a gracious and helpful presence. During the Festival, the church is open to the public, the Trinity Bake Sale and Lobster Dinner are popular traditions, the Historical Society prepares their famous shortcake in our undercroft, and we serve as a source of water and electricity (for which we are, of course, reimbursed).

The biggest sacrifice that we make is our regular worship schedule. The road race has become so large that it is impossible for us to have our 10:00 AM service, so we make do with one service at 8:00 AM. This year, however, it also requires a bit of calendar switching, as June 15th is also Trinity Sunday, a rather important day on the church calendar for parishes so named. We will postpone the feast day until the next Sunday, June 22nd.

Music Ministry: Summer Choir

During the summer months the Trinity Church Choir does not hold its regular Thursday evening rehearsals. For this reason in years past, the choir has not been offering special anthems at the 10:00 AM Eucharist on summer Sundays. Special music has been limited to an occasional soloist. However, this year, from time-to-time, the Trinity Choir will be able to offer an anthem as part of the 10:00 AM Eucharist.

A Creative Idea: Acolyte Field Trip

A New Lenten Tradition: Snuggly Stories By Liz Melvin

Saturday, April 26th, at 4:30 PM, the littlest of Trinity's people gathered with our beloved Miss Jen for our 2nd annual Snuggly Story event. It was a pajamas party, equipped with pj's, slippers, pillows and blankets, a treasure hunt, and a feast.

At the start of the night, the children gathered around Miss Jen and practiced meditation, mindfulness exercises, and learned what "seeds in our brains" we should feed. "If you feed the seeds of sadness and fear and hurt, they all grow; so let's concentrate on feeding the seeds of hope and respect and joy."



When it was time, the children were sent off to the church for their treasure hunt, where they could, "run and talk really loud and go anywhere they wanted to!" They were in the church to search for 11 colored resurrection eggs, a part of *Benjamin's Box*, a story about a boy who lived in Jerusalem during the time of Jesus. Each of the 11 eggs has a special meaning. When the hunt was finished, the children were, once again, encircling Miss Jen, their egg cartons full of colored eggs. The curiosity and excitement was palpable in the room as the late afternoon sunshine quietly became part of the circle, reminding us that we are never in the dark.

As the story of Benjamin's Box unfolded the children waited for permission to open the corresponding eggs and find their treasures. The eggs were filled with the donkey that Jesus rode into town on. a mini crown of thorns, a cross made out of nails, a piece of white linen, and a stone, a wine goblet, among other treasures.



As the children opened their eggs, their words became part of Benjamin's story....... "So that's why it's called Palm Sunday." "Maybe the goblet is for the wine, maybe they drank from it on the last supper." "I love the praying hands, whose are they?' "Is this a lasso, a whip?" "They whipped Him, and Mary saw it." "Judas did this! Oh my gosh!" "It's a crown of thorns, ow, it hurts! He had to wear it." "This must be the cloth from an

angel, or a baby's blanket. It's the cloth that covered Jesus." "Here is the rock that blocked the tomb."

What was in the empty egg? "It is an egg full of hope, love, loyalty, when someone is close to you and always stays by your side, joy, and forgiveness." "It is the empty tomb." "Everything in the story is in this one."

What was their favorite part? "the last egg... the money... the donkey....the whole thing."

What was the saddest part? "when he dies....."

What is the empty spot in the egg carton for? "the memory of the story.....a piece of Mary.....water.... bread....Benjamin...hope....the donkey so the story keeps on going.....Jesus....music notes....joy, freedom, hope."

After a delectable dinner of chicken nuggets, mac 'n cheese, and cupcakes, the sky behind Trinity was filled with a full, majestic rainbow. The pajama clad kiddies ran outside to see the final treasure and one of them shouted, "Thank you God for the end to our story! I can't wait for next year!"

The Power of Prayer By Jenny Seibyl

Prayer has been a part of my life since long before I can remember. In fact, I would say that part of the reason I am here today is because I was intensely prayed for when I was just a mere hope in my parents mind. But as I grew older at Trinity, prayer was made more concrete through Sunday school and numerous church services. The *Our Father* was part of my bedtime routine; and grace was said often at our dinner table.

Later, I was introduced to what I thought of as "special prayers" at the back of the church. I first visited this group of spiritual supporters with my mom, as we wanted to request special prayers for my friend's mother, suffering from cancer. Prayer, but more broadly faith, was still an abstract, foreign concept for me; but these special prayers after communion reached me on a deeper level, even in my grade school years. I relied on these sacred words as a way to show my quiet and subtle support.

More recently I found myself passing my pew after communion to request prayers again. I have had one of the most exciting and tremendous honors of becoming a godmother! The little guy had a

rough couple of first weeks and I, attempting to fill the large shoes of my own incredibly spiritual godmother, thought that a quiet prayer just for him would be appropriate. My recent experience as a more spiritually mature individual was more comforting than I could have ever imagined. This opportunity for prayer is one that is private, yet uniquely calming and supportive. I was reassured by this experience, but I also believe that the prayers were received, as the little one is healthy now (and cute as can be)!

I encourage everyone to stop by the baptismal font once in a while, be it for a request of healing or just a prayer of gratitude. It is one of the more unrecognized aspects of Trinity's pastoral care, but that is no measure of its value or impact.

Over the last few months I have heard numerous news stories about church Treasurers and Clergy going to jail for embezzlement. I would like to reassure parishioners of all the safeguards we have in place.

- All monies that come in through the plate offering are counted on the premises by two people.
- All expenditures are handled by the Assistant Treasurer and monitored by the Treasurer and the Finance Ministry Chair (every disbursement).
- Every expenditure amount over \$1,000 has to be approved in writing by the applicable ministry chair and at least one of the following; Senior Warden/Junior Warden/Rector (none of whom can sign checks).
- Every check over \$1,000 has to be signed by two of the following: Assistant Treasurer, Treasurer, Finance Ministry Chair.
- All withdrawals from our endowment funds require Vestry approval, a withdrawal order prepared by the financial ministry chair, and the Senior Warden's signature (witnessed).
- We also have an independent certified public accountant audit our books annually.

Any time you have questions, don't hesitate to ask.
